SUBJECT: WHY CAPITALISM MATTERS, CONCLUSION

This Memo ends our broad discussion comparing capitalism to socialism. Clearly, too many of our youth think socialism works. In large part, their belief originates not from having been taught *how* to think; rather, they have been indoctrinated with *what* to think. Moreover, many still have large loans to pay for their inculcation and group think exercises. These poor souls believe socialism will bring free healthcare, free college, gobs of benefits, with the rich paying for it all, notwithstanding our \$22 trillion *growing* debt!

Just as alarming, they know little about socialism's history. Obviously, they did not receive a critical analysis of it. Since they did not live then, they have no memory of the Cold War. They did not vicariously experience the joy with Eastern Europe—East Germany in particular—when "the Wall" came down. All they know is, in today's America, the rich get richer, the poor get poorer and the middle class appears to be disappearing faster than polar bears: all due to capitalism.

Spoiler alert: their belief is largely true, except for the part about the poor, the middle class and capitalism, *unless* they mean the elite's *crony* capitalism. US poor can now work because jobs exist for them. They now have a path to the next level! Some have jobs we were told would never return to our shores. Moreover, the middle class also appears to be on the comeback trail, thanks to our robust economy. Finally, crony capitalism —"crapitalism"— a kind of post-modern insider mercantilism, has nothing whatsoever to do with free-market, fair-trade Capitalism and even less with sound government policy.

Sadly, our college-educated youth will point to such places as Denmark numbered among socialist utopias. Nonsense. It comprises a traditional market system coupled to expensive welfare and education programs requiring huge taxes to operate. Figure on Danes making the equivalent

of \$50,000 in the United States paying 56% in income tax and, on top of that, add on another 25% for "sales" (value added) tax, not counting other local taxes. In other words, Denmark simply redistributes the income, often glossed over by Washington elites preaching the virtues of the welfare state.

No wonder, then, the non-establishment Republicans selected the consummate "outsider" Donald Trump to be their 2016 presidential candidate and why the Democrats would have picked Bernie Sanders, had there been a fair fight during their primaries. The current problem is Bernie has convinced our youth he's mainstream—Socialism's time has come; part of the Hegelian Dialectic, apparently.

Yet Bernie Sanders needs to be seen for what he is, an old-fashioned Marxist dressed up in \$700 sport coats.
